

# A New Website Design and Logo for RLC!



Thanks to the funding support from WELCA (the Women of the ELCA) organization, and a few months in the design process, the new church website and logo designs have launched as of March 01, 2021.

RLC's new logo was created to highlight the well-known

signature "Christ Window" of RLC's sanctuary architecture. The design pulls bright colors into a stain-glass imagery that enhanced the welcome of Christ's outstretched hands. The color scheme also highlights RLC, the common name used for Richfield Lutheran Church. The ELCA and South Minneapolis add an instant recognition to our congregational affiliation and location (which of course is no longer in Richfield – as it was at the beginning of the church incorporation in 1915.)

The new website was also designed to incorporate the colors of our stain-glassed window that were designed in a colorful format. The ease of website layout should allow people to easily navigate our site with just a click or two. From who are we to how do I get involved to where do I donate – the layout makes it easy to navigate the many facets of the Richfield Lutheran Church Community of Faith. Much of the website is limited in detail at this time as most programs, events, worship and educational options are currently unavailable due to pandemic restrictions. Little by little we continue to refine and tweak the pages to reflect how RLC is committed to God's Mission and Ministry in the world!

"Jesus set his face toward Jerusalem."
That's how they put it in the Bible to
say Jesus was determined to go to
Jerusalem and his crucifixion, and he
wasn't going to be deterred. In the

wilderness (Mark 1, Feb 21), Satan tempted him to take the easy way out. Last Sunday, Peter also tested Jesus, arguing that being crucified was not part of the way of the Christ (Mark 8). All along, Jesus remains focused and disciplined, noting that God's ways are often at odds with human ways of doing things.

This is hard for us to discern. Largely because discernment is more an art than a science, and because it requires experience and discipline. And here we are, entering the third week of Lent, and already our attention span is wandering! Well, there's a reason Lent lasts 40 days—and comes around every year! Keep at it. Stay with Jesus. With Jesus, set your face toward Jerusalem.

# **Annual Congregational Meeting 2021 Summary**



We held the Annual Congregational Meeting twice this year, to make sure we got as many

people involved as we could. 34 voting members attended on Sunday afternoon, February 21; and 22 additional voting members attended on Sunday afternoon, February 28.

We "met" simultaneously three ways:

- 37 people connected remotely by digital Zoom
- a limited capacity of 9 socially distanced folks, in the sanctuary, via digital Zoom on the big screen
- 10 people phoned-in through "party-line" Zoom.

#### We voted on five motions:

- 1. 88% approved modifying Robert's Rules for digital voting for the 2021 Annual Meeting
- 2. 79% approved the 2020 Annual Meeting minutes
- 3. 82% ratified changing paragraph C10.04 of the Congregational Constitution, changing quorum from a fixed number of 40 active members to 10% of active membership.
- 4. 80% approved the 2021 budget. The main goal of the 2021 budget is the reduction of RLC's funding gap through cost decreases and revenue increases.
- 88% elected the 2021 Council. Bridget
  Gorsche and Emily Schultz continued from
  2020. Susan Anderson, Patty Evans, Shirley
  Evenstad, Jim Pemberton, Cathy Salin, and
  LeRoy Weibel were elected.

Thank you everyone who made the effort to attend RLC's 2021 Annual Meeting. Over the last two weekends we were able to conduct the business of the church online, by phone and in-person!
