Ruminations from the Pastoral Pasture

Last month, the council read chapter 3 of "When Church Stops Working." Wow, this one hit home.

The past—the old way—has passed. All we really have is the moment we're in and the people we're with. And this is what church is about. Treating people as a person, not a means to some unending pursuit in which more is never enough. And so, we pay attention to what's in front of us: each other and our neighbors!

What we perceived as a crisis actually belongs to God. In humility, we attend to our connections. We do this by concerning ourselves with the present. We hear each other share our stories and we receive them. Our job, as we wait for God's arrival, is to tend to the connections of the community: we focus on the relationships, and we find waiting for God wrapped in these relationships.

This is a waiting way: we wait deeply with others. It is not a lonely waiting. This waiting for God is all about this moment with these people. It might look like this way of life has no direction, but it offers a new direction, a new way of life. Congregational life is now all about this moment with these people. A waiting church finds life not by giving all their attention to the future and the resources needed to escape the perceived crisis, but rather by stewarding those connections. In stewarding the connections, the future will take care of itself. In this waiting, it's not that we're doing nothing. Rather, we do the most important thing: we give our people a way of life that is all about this moment with these people.

Holiday Health

This article came about from a little question that was posed to me at a recent coffee hour. " Is it true that people die alot more on holidays?" I have to be honest it sent me to my research materials as I had no clue. Turns out it is true and Thanksgiving has the highest numbers of the winter holiday season. The reasons vary but the top ones include:

- 1) eating heavy, high carb meals and napping immediately after.
- 2) increased alcohol consumption and in short time span (2 hours or so).

Getting COVID, RSV and Flu shots help fight resp. illnesses and eating vitamin rich foods and beverages also helps.
