Taking the Lord's Name in Vain

I confess that I've developed a habit of calling out to God more lately. My household will attest to this. It often occurs

in response to the little trials and conundrums of daily life or in amazement and surprise of something unexpected. I tend to voice, "Good Lord!" or "Lord Jesus, help us in our time of trial!" The other day, one of these exclamations arose out of me while sitting in the dugout with teammates in the middle of our baseball game. I was feeling the arthritis flaring up in my shoulder, and I said, "O, my good Lord!" A new teammate who has recently learned my profession, questioned it. "So, do you ever think that's taking the Lord's name in vain?" Uh oh! I had been convicted!

I've been pondering that 2nd commandment more lately and I appreciate Martin Luther's explanation to it in his Small Catechism. In response to "What does this mean?" he describes, "We should fear and love God, and so we should not use God's name to curse, swear, practice magic, lie or deceive, but in every time of need call upon him, pray to him, praise him and give him thanks."

I think most people were brought up and made to think about the "swearing" or "cursing" part of it – like if you say, "Jesus Christ!" in response to stubbing your toe. And I suppose, depending on the way it is being used, that example could be an infraction of the commandment.

I think the commandment is weightier than that. Currently I've witnessed people in power using God's name as justification for atrocities, asserting principles which clearly have nothing to do with Jesus, and/or asserting God's will for them remaining in power. One world leader talked about their nation's military as the "most moral army in the world," despite overwhelming evidence that innocent non-combatants have been shown little regard and even children have been targeted. I'd argue that this the egregiousness misuse God seeks to address and call-out in the command. The effects are so dire to faith. It deserves to be called out.

Beyond that, the commandment is ultimately to be grounded in relationship. God is a God who desires and loves to be in relationship with us! A huge part of relationship is in communication, and in our communication, God wants to be near, close, and honored.

In this way, I've found most of my personal exclamations of "O, my Good Lord" to

God is aware and might even empathize with my shoulder pain! I admit also that my "O, my Lord" is often spoken in a bit of humor with God. Can we allow God a sense of humor? I take joy in it, thinking that God is concerned with such a dweeb as myself and my little daily moments.

Now, at the same time, I do need to be aware of my relationship with others. Others such as my teammate may not be so free or approving of my use. I might be aware of this for their sake, so that I do not inadvertently offend or, worse yet, make them to believe faith is false.

As with most things, it will all come down to a matter of the heart. I'm grateful God sees our hearts and thus is seeking to create a clean heart of faith in us every day. In the meantime, we might all continue to pray, "Almighty God, thank you, and continue to help us in our times of trial. Amen."

Playground Update

Thanks to lots of work by Denise Hagen from CELC, Pastor Charlie, and Randy O'Brien, we have an exciting plan for the CELC playground area destroyed in the May 19th bus accident. Midwest Playscapes will be replacing the play structures, fencing and ground cover. We expect it to be completed in six weeks. Soon we will have pictures on display for all to see. We like Midwest Playscapes because of their adherence to various standards of safety, as well as a requirement that all installers are Certified Playground Safety Inspectors. (CPSI).

The children who were on the playground at the time of the bus accident are doing well. CELC offered an evening program for children, families and staff to process the events of May 19th. That gathering was led by several counselors experienced in working with children.

Meanwhile, I have been working on the insurance end of things. The bus company insurance has not been forthcoming with support, so we have moved ahead with our own insurance company. We are hopeful that our insurance company will be able to recover all replacement expenses including our insurance deductible.

Mostly we are looking forward to the day when the playground will no longer be broken (in the words of the children) and we can all get back to our regular responsibilities.

Our State Fair is a great State Fair!

August always is the hit of summer calendars! The crowds, the sites, the giveaways, the shows and most of all..**THE FOOD**.

I once heard it described as the one time that over inbibing (food and d rink) is forgiven. But should it be? I read a statistic saying that the emergency crews at the MN State Fair see the most heart events in the shortest time (12 days) of the whole year.
