

Last Sunday's gospel was about the Good Shepherd. Next Sunday's is the Vine and the Branches. Both are beloved images, trying to capture the relationship we have with Jesus. In

both, the sheep and the branches have life when with the shepherd and the vine. Without connection to the shepherd and the vine, life is perilous for the sheep and the branches.

And yet, we seem bound to try to go it on our own. It is our human condition. And the image of the rugged, lone individual is pervasive in our culture. But, Jesus says, try as you may, you are bound for failure. We need to stay connected, "abide" with Jesus. Here is true life.

This past week, as part of RLC's continued efforts to BE in community with the community, I was approved by RLC church council to be on the Board of Directors for TRUST Inc,

representing the Richfield Lutheran Community of Faith. As this partnership in ministry starts to evolve, I wanted to take time this issue and next to tell you a bit more about TRUST.

TRUST Inc. is a nonprofit coalition of Minneapolis congregations that has served the needs of seniors, families and youth of Minneapolis since 1970. Initially consisting of eight congregations, TRUST now has a membership of 20 churches, representing nine different denominations.

The original mission of TRUST was for the congregations to join in a common effort of service to others, with that service being open to all and transcending historical denominational differences. They created a consortium of congregations to provide human services in the community, doing together what no individual congregation could do alone and providing these services across racial and economic lines and physical barriers.

The partner congregations of TRUST have a proven record of working together to meet the needs of the community. Volunteer recruitment comes from the coalition's members and the community with partnership and disbursement of those volunteers/resources to meet community needs.

As communities of faith continue to see decreases in active members and abilities, we come to a realization "We can't always do it alone." As RLC continues to navigate the future in our community, we will continue to explore how we partner together to meet the current community needs and explore new ways in which we can best do outreach ministry with the most impact for vibrancy and growth together.

Next week, I will share some of the many programs currently a part of TRUST that we may partner with in the future. I look forward to seeing some of you this coming Sunday!

This is the official kick-off of our 2021 Building Study. Anne visited and toured RLC recently. She has a lot of exciting ideas for us!

## **Background on our Building Study:**

**Purpose:** We started our Building Study back in 2019, to find the best way to consolidate childcare in the

education wing, and bring the Nursery over to that side of the building.

This required us to look at building code issues:

- Fire prevention
- Accessibility
- Having an elevator

The study produced a great location for an elevator, but moving the Nursery proved to be very expensive, and also thorny: either the church would have to give up/move the library, or childcare would have to go without a Nursery.

This drove home the most important finding of this part of the Building Study: the need to look at both the church and childcare spaces together, not in isolation.

While we were still considering these findings, the pandemic happened, and everything was placed on hold. Therefore, this first part of the Building Study was never presented to the congregation. Nothing happened with the building or the Study during the pandemic.

With the 2021 budget, we identified the need to produce an additional \$100,000 of income from improved building use, in addition to the average annual income from childcare. The 2021 budget approved a second Building Study for this purpose. This second Study comprises all our spaces, church and childcare.

## **Beginning the Second Building Study**

The ELCA building consultant's input is the first step to start our visioning: How can we make our church spaces more open, welcoming, and flexible for all our varied programming needs.

Another part of the study will look at the creation of a toddler wing in the area of the current Nursery and the Common Grounds. A project like that could generate additional revenue. If it is capable of building revenue toward our long-term financial sustainability, it would become part of an overall building plan.

That building plan will ultimately be voted on by the congregation at a special congregational meeting later this year.

This is why we want a robust Advisory Committee with as many members of the congregation as possible. We want input from many different viewpoints. For those who cannot participate in Zoom meetings, we will distribute meeting summary notes via email and through the newsletter. As we start re-opening, we will also hold in-person informational meetings again. We are looking forward to shaping RLC's future together! Please join us on May 23<sup>rd</sup>!


