This season has the highest number of emergency medical visits of the year. Currently 26% or greater than any other part of the year. Visits aren't just overeating cardiac or gastric (heartburn or worse) visits. It includes kitchen accidents including cuts and burns. Even stab wounds cutting hams and turkeys.

Don't forget falls off ladders putting up outdoor lights, moving decoration tubs and artificial trees. What about rushing on icy walks or snow mounds. WHEW and so much more!

There is the added stress of shopping, getting to kids programs and the challenges of finances and gift giving.
