No matter what, the love of God will be there to meet us and lift us up!

I picked up trash starting at the daycare playground and worked my way around to the front of the church where I was so distracted by the weeds crawling up the brick that I focused on that (those weeds are probably already back). Meanwhile others were trimming trees, working on the CELC playground, washing windows, and doing lots of indoor cleaning. Thank you all.

The CELC playground looked like new after cleaning up, weeding and lots of raking to level the surface. Two days later it was a mangled mess but, praise God, the bus that careened into the playground missed the children and adults. One of the teachers was close enough to pull three children out of harm's way including two that had been on the swings that ended up wrapped around a bus tire. That's how close it was. 14 other children and their teachers were toward the back of the playground, which was a also miracle because normally there would have been many more kids in the front where the bus ended up. Those three with minor injuries are mending, there will be support for those traumatized (including staff) and we are more than grateful for the miracle of physical damage without loss of life. Nevertheless, prayers of gratitude, healing, calming are appreciated. And please include the bus driver as she recovers from her injuries.

Nursing Notes Bees, Wasps and all the Buzz

Bees are the flying insect we think about the most and for many fear. Bees bring thoughts of allergic reactions to possible death. Bees instead prefer to stay away and go about their business. They sting only when they or their nests are challenged.

Let's talk about Bees. They feel fuzzy, body is rounder than wasps. They are more docile despite reputation about injury. Bees eat nectar, usually from flowers and pollen. Their job is to make honey and pollinating plant matter. Despite their docile reputation they are the more dangerous of the flying stinger insects. That said, ER reports list very manageable numbers of life loss and serious sting reports. One of the shocking statistics is the number deaths from bee stings that the victim despite having a prescription for a epi pen but did not have it on their person or along at the location where the bees were there.

Wasps are slimmer with narrow waists. Wasps are more aggressive. They reside in a paperlike nest. They prefer but also eat insects. Hornets are a type of Wasp rather than a completely different insect. Hornets are larger, more robust and thicker bodies. They are aggressive with powerful stings. They are protective of their nests. Hornets mostly eat insects but will eat fruit when insects are low numbered. Wasps tend to eat a variety of fruit and insects and other diverse substances.

Bees have barbed stingers while Wasps have smooth stingers with a venom sac attached to lubricate the stinger causing a localized reaction. Bee stings also have a venom but reaction is allergic to the components of the venom. It is reported that bee venom does react second and future stings. The problem there is no way to predict if you have had that first exposure so always assume you have been exposed.

Wasps most often are the actual offenders of human stings.

Wear bug repellent, long pants and sleeves when in bug infested areas and if you have known allergy take your antihistamine and epi pen along don't leave them sitting at home as time is of the essence.

There is a lot one can learn about these creatures in God's world. I got my research from The University of MN Dept of Entomology insect division. They reminded me to always remember that these flying stinging creatures provide valuable services to our world and while they sting they are protecting their place in our world.

A good way to think about them....


