At the end of this month, I will have officially served one year as pastor with this blessed congregation! Kind of surreal, if you ask me! Like many things in life, in some ways it seems longer and in other ways a quick blur. Either way, looking back on the year brings

much gratitude and wonder. For my article this month, indulge me in a little look back on some of the highlights of the year gone by!

- *Highlights from last November included a lefse-making party and a Christmas decorating get-together with church members and volunteers from the CELC
- *Advent lifted the themes of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love and culminated in a beautiful Christmas Eve candlelight worship with 100+ in attendance
- *Stars graced the narthex throughout the Epiphany season of light, a gift from the children of the CELC
- *Lent was marked by "Late Lunch Lent" midweek Holden Evening Prayer and delightful soup luncheons in the Mary and Martha room
- *Easter Celebration featured members of the Crosstown Community Band and a reminder that death has been destroyed in love
- *May 17 members gathered for an all-church spring-cleaning day, sprucing up the facility both inside and out
- *Two days later, May 19, we experienced the fear and trauma of a school bus crashing into and through the church playground as 14 children played and 3 teachers supervised. By God's miraculous grace, every person involved was able to walk away, and we witnessed the heroics and amazing swift actions of our CELC staff responding to care and protect.
- *The crash spurred us to follow up with mental health therapy professionals offering counsel for staff, children, and households alike, and we walked alongside each other as staff, households, congregation, and council to heal, recover, and put actions in motion to address the damage and rebuild.
- *Throughout the summer, we explored "God's Greatest Hits" of the Hebrew Scriptures in a worship and preaching series.
- *In July the parking lot was packed and filled with life as RLC and the CELC hosted an all-community ice cream social in attended by roughly 175 people of all ages
- *August featured a robust collective worship at Veteran's Park with House of Prayer, Woodlake, and Oak Grove Lutheran churches, and "Into the Woods" was hosted as the annual Hoi Polloi Players production.
- *September has brought a shift to the Narrative Lectionary in worship and preaching focusing on the entire arc of the Biblical story, and in just the last couple weeks we've celebrated the installation of the brand new playground

Richfield Lutheran Newsletter October 2025 There have been many women leaders at RLC as well as many who had a quieter RLC presence but they all shared the good and the bad of breast cancer.

Some lost their battles and others lived long lives after their cancer journey rocked their worlds. This year I joined their numbers. To tell you despite being a nurse and having an educated understanding of this disease that I wasn't terrified would be a lie. I went into the screenings , biopsies and finally the surgery with open eyes and it was still scary and lonely. Despite supportive friends and family, spouses and caring health providers I can tell you that this has totally rocked me and that almost every woman I know who has been through this, this year or 30 years ago tells the same story. This is a very lonely and very challenging process to ones core of feminity. This is the disfiguring of a part of a woman's body that says to the world I am a woman.

I feel very lucky and blessed by God who I talked to nearly constantly for the 7 months this was going on. I feel bad for those who don't have God to lean on. I am happy to tell you that God walked every step with me and he enfolded me in his arms. I am not usually someone to talk about things this way but I am struck by the fact that in 2025 we are still losing women to breast cancer. AND MEN..YES MEN. Research continues despite the blow of the closing of the over 200 separate research trials at the National Institute of Health and the firing of their research teams; the Susan Kolman Research programs as are several at University Medical Schools across the country. There are 5 big drugs that are now released to patients this year and some drug companies are supplementing financially to get them covered. There is much more needed and of course healthcare costs are at risk. Discuss these issues with your MDs, your pharmacies, your political representatives and anyone else who will listen. These are overwhelming issues but if we all work to be more informed and share our concerns we can make a difference

I will have red cancer awareness pins at church this month. Please wear them proudly.

I know this was not my normal kind of article and I ask for your acceptance as it has weighted heavily on my heart.

If you have a loved one you would like named, please let Bonnie know by Tuesday, October 28th and their names will also be included in this meaningful service.




