Mighty God, the splendor of Solomon's temple cannot compare to the majesty of your heart. Show your heart in this place and take up residence in us, that we would love and serve in the Spirit of Christ, crucified and risen for all. Amen.

FIRST READING: 1 Kings 5:1-5

(Amid a newfound peace, Solomon communicates the plans to build "a house for God's name.")

Now King Hiram of Tyre sent his servants to Solomon when he heard that they had anointed him king in place of his father, for Hiram had always been a friend to David. ²Solomon sent word to Hiram, saying, ³"You know that my father David could not build a house for the name of the Lord his God because of the warfare with which his enemies surrounded him, until he put them under the soles of his feet. ⁴But now the Lord my God has given me rest on every side; there is neither adversary nor misfortune. ⁵So I intend to build a house for the name of the Lord my God, as the Lord said to my father David, 'Your son, whom I will set on your throne in your place, shall build the house for my name.'

Word of God, word of life.

Thanks be to God.

PSALM 27 (read responsively)

The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?

The LORD is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?

 When evildoers assail me to devour my flesh my adversaries and foes they shall stumble and fall.

³ Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear; though war rise up against me, yet I will be confident.

⁴ One thing I asked of the LORD; this I seek:

to live in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the LORD, and to inquire in his temple.

⁵ For he will hide me in his shelter in the day of trouble;

he will conceal me under the cover of his tent; he will set me high on a rock.

Now my head is lifted up above my enemies all around me, and I will offer in his tent sacrifices with shouts of joy;
 I will sing and make melody to the LORD.

⁷ Hear, O LORD, when I cry aloud; be gracious to me and answer me!

- 8 "Come," my heart says, "seek his face!" Your face, LORD, do I seek.
- 9 Do not hide your face from me.

Do not turn your servant away in anger, you who have been my help.

Do not cast me off; do not forsake me, O God of my salvation!

- ¹⁰ If my father and mother forsake me, the LORD will take me up.
- ¹¹ Teach me your way, O LORD, and lead me on a level path because of my enemies.
- ¹² Do not give me up to the will of my adversaries, for false witnesses have risen against me, and they are breathing out violence.
- ¹³ I believe that I shall see the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living.

¹⁴ Wait for the LORD; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the LORD!

SECOND READING: 1 Kings 8:1-13

(The entire people gather to witness and worship at the completion and dedication of the temple. The glory of the Lord fills the space as the people remember God's acts of faithfulness and liberation.)

Then Solomon assembled the elders of Israel and all the heads of the tribes, the leaders of the ancestral houses of the Israelites, before King Solomon in Jerusalem, to bring up the ark of the covenant of the LORD out of the city of David, which is Zion. ² All the people of Israel assembled to King Solomon at the festival in the month Ethanim, which is the seventh month. ³ And all the elders of Israel came, and the priests carried the ark. ⁴ So they brought up the ark of the LORD, the tent of meeting, and all the holy vessels that were in the tent; the priests and the Levites brought them up. ⁵ King Solomon and all the congregation of Israel, who had assembled before him, were with him before the ark, sacrificing so many sheep and oxen that they could not be counted or numbered. ⁶ Then the priests brought the ark of the covenant of the LORD to its place, in the inner sanctuary of the house, the most holy place, underneath the wings of the cherubim. ⁷ For the cherubim spread out their wings over the place of the ark, so that the cherubim made a covering above the ark and its poles. 8 The poles were so long that the ends of the poles were seen from the holy place in front of the inner sanctuary, but they could not be seen from outside; they are there to this day. ⁹ There was nothing in the ark except the two tablets of stone that Moses had placed there at Horeb, where the LORD made a covenant with the Israelites when they came out of the land of Egypt. ¹⁰ And when the priests came out of the holy place, a cloud filled the house of the LORD, ¹¹ so that the priests could not stand to minister because of the cloud, for the glory of the LORD filled the house of the LORD.

¹² Then Solomon said,

"The LORD has said that he would dwell in thick darkness."

¹³ I have built you an exalted house, a place for you to dwell forever."

¹⁹ Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." ²⁰ The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" ²¹ But he was speaking of the temple of his body. ²² After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

Next Sunday...

We recognize all those who rest in God's eternal love in a special All Saints Sunday. In worship we'll remember, name, and lift in prayer those in the congregation who have died in the past year, and we'll also be invited to honor all others who have gone before us. In the scripture readings, we follow the narrative as it intersects with the life of the prophet Elijah in 1 Kings 19. Elijah experiences great difficulty, sadness, hunger, and hardship amid the struggle to be faithful. God listens, brings sustenance, speaks amid the supposed silence, and ultimately sends Elijah back into the thick of the world. It may point to a promise of how God still encounters us in our grief today, lifting us up, and letting us know that God's work of love continues, even in death.
